





1. Only souvenir cards, intaglio-printed material, or related items are acceptable for consignment. Interested sellers should contact the auctioneer with any questions BEFORE sending any material. The fastest contact is by e-mail;

- 2. Consignors are responsible for adequately describing their lots, including S.C.C.S. numbers and their minimum bids. Lots must be of a minimum \$1 value.
- 3. Consignors will pay the postage to ship their lots and postage/insurance for return of unsold material. There is NO consignment fee, however, the S.C.C.S. will retain 10% of the selling price as a commission fee. Care shall be taken to protect any material submitted, but the auctioneer and the S.C.C.S. assumes NO liability and the consignor(s) should verify and/or provide their own insurance coverage.
- 4. Lots will be sold to the highest bidder. In the case of tie bids, the first bid received shall be awarded the lot. Bids below the "minimum" listed are NOT accepted. Bid in \$1.00 increments only, i.e., NOT "cents." There is NO "buyer's premium".
- 5. Successful bidders will pay the postage, insurance and packaging for their lots. There is NO buyer's fee, but NO lots will be shipped until the notice for same is paid in full. Payment is expected within ten (10) days of notice. Late payment may result in exclusion from future bidding. Checks should be made out to the auctioneer NOT the S.C.C.S.
- 6. Returns are acceptable within ten days of receipt of shipment. Please specify the reason for the return (damage, mis-attribution, etc.) Mistakes on the bidder's part are NOT sufficient reason for return.
- 7. Bids and/or questions may be e-mailed—the quickest way—regular mail, or carrier.



There was little information given, and no references to the size of the items. They provided estimates, but, unfortunately did not publish the prices realized. I did a bit of Slania research.

(Opposite, top left.) I have been unable to identify this item. Estimated at \$78.00.

(Opposite, top right.) A bookplate finished in 1994 for Count Lennart Bernadotte. It depicts his coat of arms, and relates to his castle's library. Mainau is an island in the Bodensee. Est. \$56.00.


(Opposite, middle left.) An Arabian horse, a steel engraving after a sketch of Piotr Michalowski, issued to commemorate the 95th anniversary of the Philatelic Club in Copenhagen. Est. \$56.00.

(Opposite, middle right.) An 18th Century castle, Royal Palace, used on a Monaco aerogram. Est. \$111.00.

(Opposite, bottom, and this page middle and bottom.) I have been unable to find these. The Captain & crew was estimated at \$44.00, the three nautical scenes at \$33.00 each. Personally, these four pieces don't look like Slania's work to me,

but appear to more like something from the American Bank Note Company. I am particularly curious about the angled cuts on the right of three of the items. [Maybe, it was a collection of engravings that included Slania's work.]

Finally, the battle scene (top, left) appears to be a portion of *The Battle of Grunwald*, the original being (204x116mm). I do not know if it is a cut-down, or cropped for publication. It was estimated at \$111.00.







But next in line is probably "The Landing of Columbus" which shows up on seven different cards in subtly different engravings. Predictably, most of these appear around 1992, during the 400th anniversary of Columbus arriving in the New World.

In Gene Hessler's book *U.S. Essay, Proof and Specimen Notes* [BNR Press, 1979], the author acknowledges the research of Dr. Glenn E. Jackson, who identified five versions of this engraving, each by a different engraver. These were all apparently commissioned by Continental Bank Note in the early 1860s for the back of the original series \$5 National Bank Note, which Continental designed and printed. Several engravers were invited to try their hand at the scene, from which the best was selected. Detailed close-ups in the book compare the design differences on each one. I was curious to know whether any of these engravings appeared on souvenir cards ... and most do!

The model for the engravings is the 18 x 12 foot oil painting by John Vanderlyn [1775-1852], completed

in 1846 and hung in the Capitol Rotunda the following year. Commissioned in 1836, it took a decade for Vanderlyn to finish the massive work.

The engraved "Landing of Columbus" first appears on PS-1, the first official USPS souvenir card, issued in 1960 at the 1st International Philatelic Congress in Barcelona. The BEP supplied the engraving and printed the card for the Postal Service. No engraver is mentioned in the text on the card, but this engraving matches one that Hessler suggests may be the work of Lorenzo Hatch.






[In the, Catalog of United States Souvenir Cards, by Frank R. Bruns, Jr. and James H. Bruns (Washington Press, 1980): "For convenience, the vignette was produced from an existing engraving by Lorenzo J. Hatch. The card's die-stamped central design, depicting the Landing of Columbus, is from the back of the \$5.00 National Bak Note, Series 1875. The motif was deemed acceptable since a section of the Post Office's Barcelona exhibit featured a display of U.S. stamps issued in honor of Columbus." Ed.]




The same engraving shows up on B-67 (España '84), again without credit given to an engraver. Comparing the two vignettes shows that the BEP darkened the earlier Barcelona card with diagonal crosshatching, most apparent across the sky. It served to give more depth, but the vignette on B-67 is clearly the unadulterated original and details such as the faces and the tiny ships on the horizon are more discernable.



American Bank Note's rendition of the vignette appears on SO-83, issued at the 1991 Philadelphia National Stamp Exhibition. James Bannister [1821-1901] is noted in the text as the engraver of this example, completed in 1863. Like the version above, it was considered for the back of the original series \$5 NBN, but was passed over.




The "Landing of Columbus" was also considered for use on the back on of a proposed design for a \$1 Legal Tender Note in 1869, which was never issued. This time Lorenzo Hatch executed a slightly larger engraving for the BEP, stretching across nearly the entire note. The design, never entirely completed, was featured on B-153, issued for FUN '92. (This particular engraving was not among the five versions examined by Glenn Jackson, and I have to say it's my personal favorite.)




The winning design for the back of the original \$5 National Bank Note is shown on B-159, issued at the 1992 ANA show in Orlando. Though not specifical-

ly noted on the card itself, Hessler identifies the engraver in his essay book as Walter Shirlaw [1838-1908]. After printing the first charter \$5 NBNs, Continental eventually turned over its national currency printing plates to the BEP (as did other private bank note companies) as the Bureau took on printing of all U.S. currency in the 1870s.

Two other souvenir cards depict the Landing of Columbus in a smaller form. B-156 (WCSE 1992) and B-161 (APS 1992) both feature Scott #118, the 1869 15¢ stamp and its inverted error (#119b). James Smillie [1807-1885] is credited with engraving the tiny vignette on these stamps. Though he had to reduce an 18-foot painting to 7/8 of an inch, Smillie still managed to capture many details of the original. The scene is also found on the 2¢ stamp of the 1893 Columbian series (#231) – but that stamp has never made its way onto a souvenir card.

















[When the USPS first started their Commemorative Panel program, in 1972, the American Bank Note Company provided sheets with text and, usually, three engravings. Their eighth panel (opposite) included the same Columbus engraving (although the engraver is not identified).

ABNCo eventually lost the contract and the new provider (?) apparently did not have the resources to furnish steel-engraved vignettes and, I believe, resorted to photo-engraved images. The quality of same suffered. Ed.]

To date there have been 25 leaders of the Bureau filling 26 different terms (William Meredith headed twice). They were originally designated as "chief," which lasted until the 1890s. Thereafter, heads of the BEP were known as "directors." A number of them were political appointees, but most came from a background in government service, with some rising from the ranks of the BEP production floor. The Bureau is a division of the Department of the Treasury.



Greg Alexander's article led me to wonder wether there were more engravings of the paintings in the Rotunda that found their way unto souvenir cards.

As far as I can tell, there are eight of these large (12'x8') paintings in the Rotunda:



1) Baptism Of Pocahontas, John Gadsby Chapman (1823-1879), 1839, placed 1840. Jamestown, 1613-14.



2) Declaration Of Independence, John Trumbull (1756-1843), 1818, placed 1826. Philadelphia, 28 June 1776.



3) Discovery Of The Mississippi By De Soto, William Henry Powell (1823-1879), 1853, placed 1855 (the last one). Near Natchez, 8 May 1541.



4) Embarkation Of The Pilgrims, Robert Walter Weir (1803-1889), 1843, placed 1843. On the deck of the Speedwell, 22 July 1620, before they left Delfs Haven, Holland, for North America.



5) General George Washington Resigning His Commission, John Trumbull (1756-1843), 1824, placed 1826. Maryland State House in Annapolis, 23 December 1783.

6) Landing Of Columbus (see Greg's previous article).



7) Surrender of General Burgoyne, John Trumbull (1756-1843), 1821, placed 1826.

The surrender took place on 17 October 1777 at Saratoga, NY, and ended the last major campaign of the Revolutionary War.




8) Surrender Of Lord Cornwallis, John Trumbull (1756-1843), 1820, placed 1826.

The surrender, 19 October 1781, at Yorktown, VA, ended the Revolutionary War.


Just as Trumball got the most paintings, the De Soto engraving got the most card usage: four.




B-44, IPMS 1978. Engraving by Frederick Girsch (1821-1895).




The *Surrender of General Burgoyne* was engraved by Frederick Girsch and used on the back of the \$500 National Bank Note, First Charter Period.

(In his book, *The Comprehensive Guide to U.S. Paper Money*, Fifth Edition (BNR Press, 1972), Gene Hessler (p. 303) errs in describing it as the *Surrender of General Gates at Saratoga*. Burgoyne surrendered TO Gates.)

Pocahontas' Baptism and the surrendering by Lord Cornwallis, either have not been engraved, or at least not used on currency, as far as I can tell.



この金兌換乙弐拾円券は、昭和5年から始まった新シリーズ券のひとつとして、昭和6年に発行された。表面の肖像は、飛鳥時代の政治家で、大化の改新を実行した藤原鎌足が採用された。この弐拾円券では、額面金額の「弐拾円」の文字が縦に印制されているため、通称「縦書き弐拾円」と呼ばれている。肖像の凹版彫刻は、加藤舎吉彫刻官が担当した。またこの弐拾円券の表裏には、藤原鎌足を祀る奈良県の該山神社の十三重塔や拝殿が描かれている。

This gold convertible 20 yen banknote was issued as one of a new series of notes that started from 1930. The portrait of this note was a famous politician, Fujiwara no Kamatari who executed the Taika Reform of Asuka era of the 7th century. In this 20 yen note, the Japanese character of "20 yen" is printed with vertical direction. The portrait of this banknote was engraved by the Senior Engraver, Kurakichi Kato.

Moreover, the Thirteen-Story Pagoda and the Sanctuary in Tanzan Shrine at Nara Prefecture that enshrines Fujiwara no Kamatari, are engraved on the front and the reverse side of this note.
