



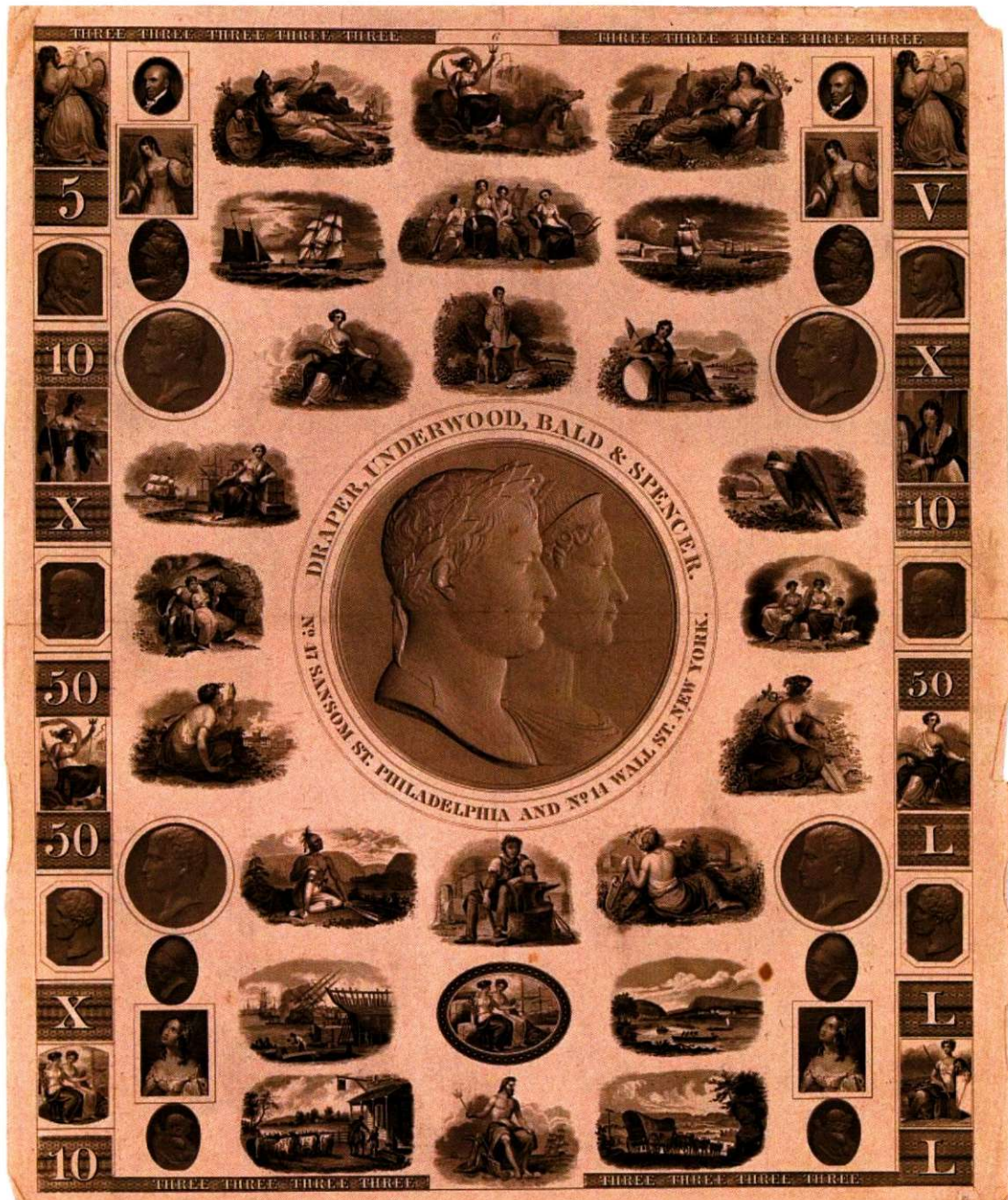

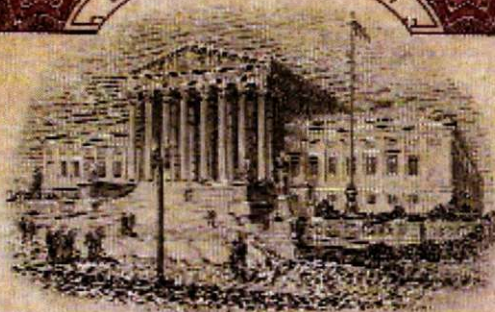

RULES:

1. Only souvenir cards, intaglio-printed material, or related items are acceptable for consignment. Interested sellers should **contact the auctioneer with any questions BEFORE sending any material.** The fastest contact is by e-mail;

2. Consignors are responsible for adequately describing their lots, including S.C.C.S. numbers and their minimum bids. Lots must be of a minimum \$1 value.

3. Consignors will pay the postage to ship their lots and postage/insurance for return of unsold material. There is NO consignment fee, however, the S.C.C.S. will retain 10% of the selling price as a commission fee. Care shall be taken to protect any material submitted, but the auctioneer and the S.C.C.S. assumes NO liability and the consignor(s) should verify and/or provide their own insurance coverage.

4. Lots will be sold to the highest bidder. In the case of tie bids, the first bid received shall be awarded the lot. Bids below the "minimum" listed are NOT accepted. Bid in \$1.00 increments only, i.e., NOT "cents." There is NO "buyer's premium".

5. Successful bidders will pay the postage, insurance and packaging for their lots. NO lots will be shipped until the notice for same is paid in full. Payment is expected within ten (10) days of notice. Late payment may result in exclusion from future bidding. Checks should be made out to the auctioneer NOT the S.C.C.S.

6. Returns are acceptable within ten days of receipt of shipment. Please specify the reason for the return (damage, mis-attribution, etc.) Mistakes on the bidder's part are NOT sufficient reason for return.

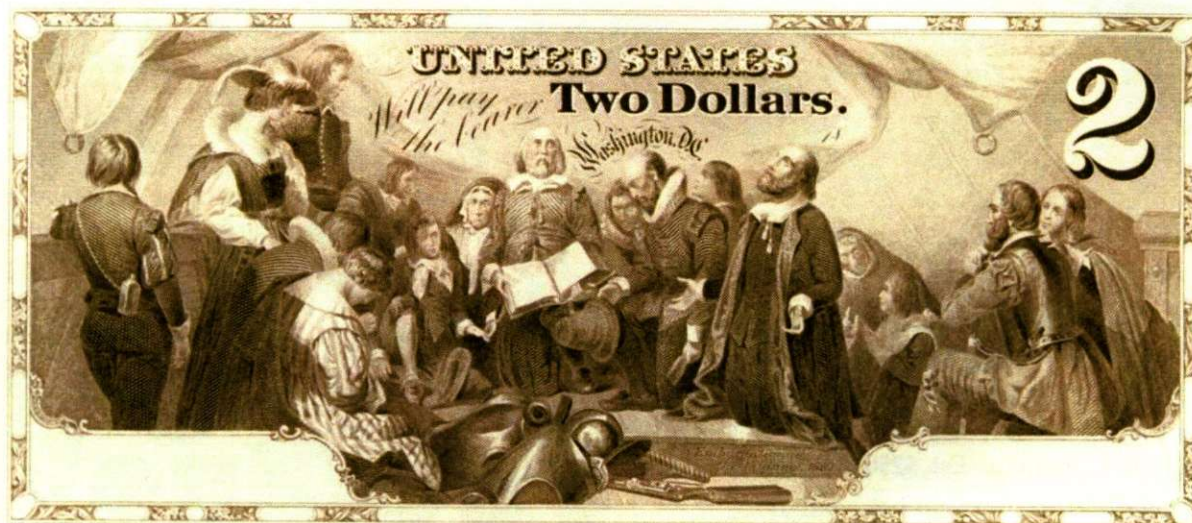
In "Recent Auctions" in the last issue, I questioned if some lots were actually the work of Czeslaw Slania. **Greg Alexander** and **Paul Melnick** both ascribed them to the British American Bank Note company, and Greg sent some scans of their calendar artwork!





Greg also noted that the *Embarkation of the Pilgrims* was on F1981B, for the 79th IPPDS&EU Convention in Washington, DC, in May 1981. The card indicates the engraving was done by Joseph Prosper Ourdan (1828-1881), who joined what would become the BEP

in late 1862, and eventually became Chief of the Engraving Division. He joined the National Bank Note Company in 1867. He was the engraver of *Columbus Discovery of Land* at left on B-195.

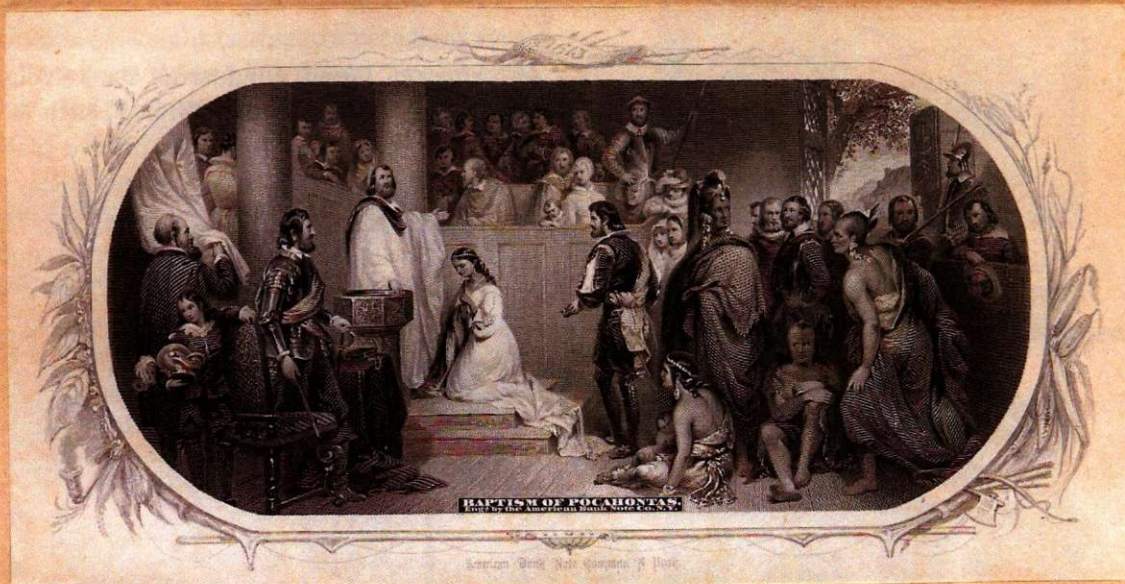
BAPTISM OF POCAHONTAS

[An Editor always likes positive responses! Ed.]

The Chapman painting of the *Baptism of Pocahontas* was engraved by Charles Kennedy Burt (1823-1892) of the American Bank Note Company and used on the back of the \$20 National Bank Note of the First Charter Period, the Original Series (1863-1875) and the Series of 1875.

[The painting depicts the ceremony in which Pocahontas, daughter of the influential Algonkian chief Powhatan, was baptized and given the name Rebecca in an Anglican church, in 1614±, Jamestown. This ceremony and her subsequent marriage to John Rolfe helped to establish peaceful relations between the colonists and the Tidewater tribes. The previous life-dates I listed for Mr. Chapman were incorrect, and should have been 1808-1889. Ed.]



Back in 1993, Mike Bean printed a short run of 100 souvenir cards for the SCCS Washington Chapter, which were distributed at NAPEX that year. The card was [then] assigned a catalog number of S1993D. These were printed from a plate engraved by the John A. Lowell Bank Note Co. in Boston; at the bottom it bears the company imprint and a copyright date of 1910. It's a small card and the engraved portrait of President McKinley measures only about 3"x4".

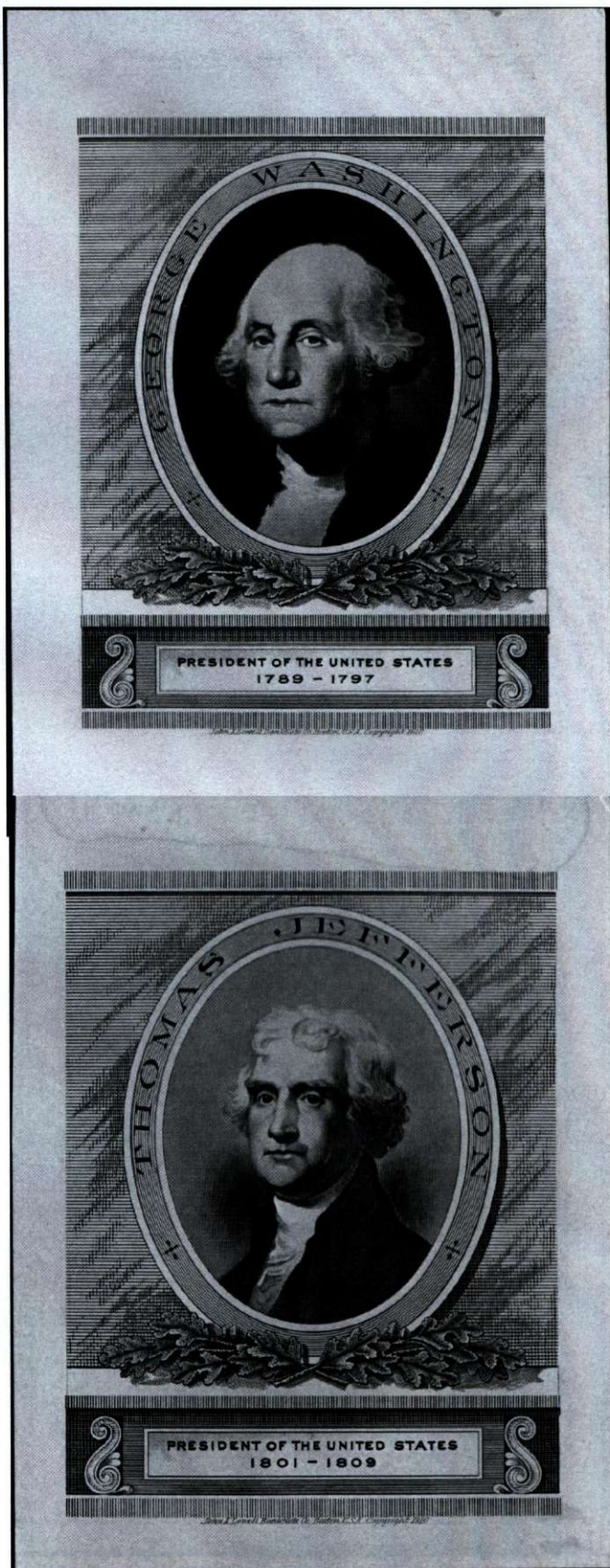
I later learned that Lowell Bank Note produced a set of these engraved presidential cards, of which McKinley was one. Recently, I obtained 10 of these original cards, including McKinley. Though these don't qualify as souvenir cards or even forerunners, they certainly share a kinship and I felt they were a nice addition. [Our Society is a "national organization of souvenir card and intaglio-printed vignette collectors and dealers." Ed.]

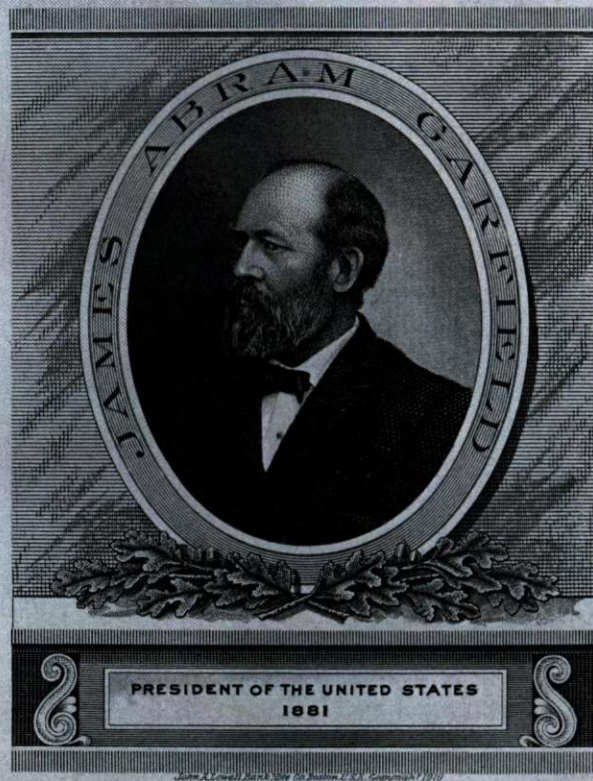
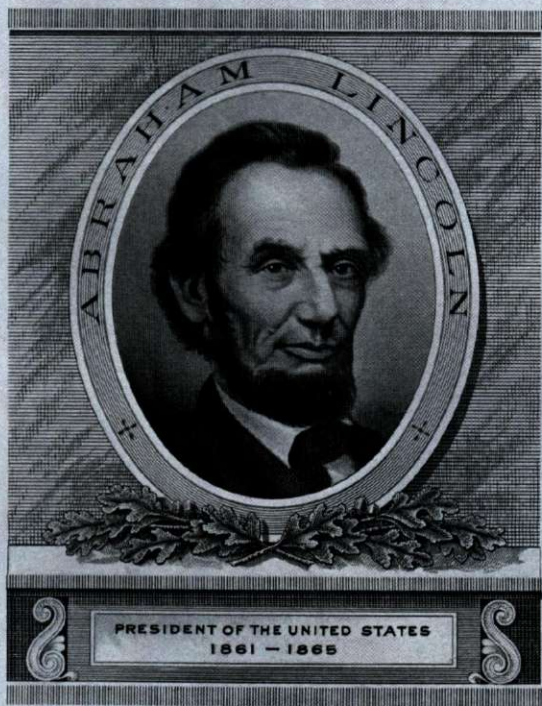
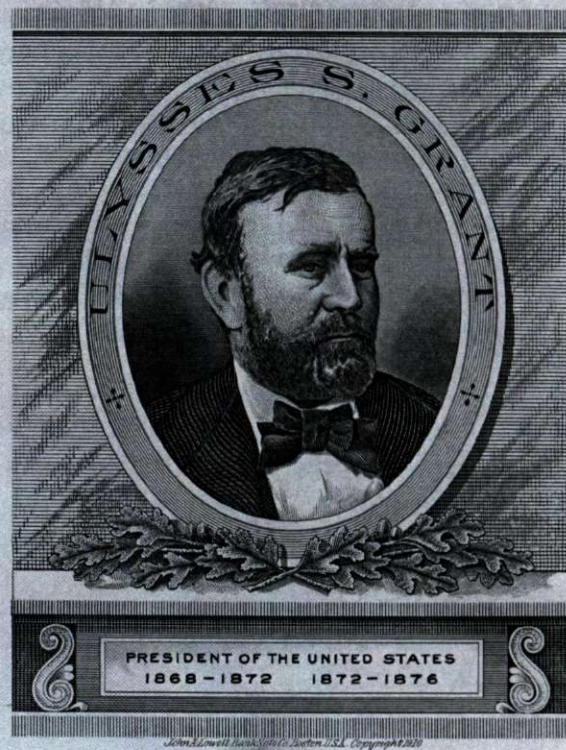
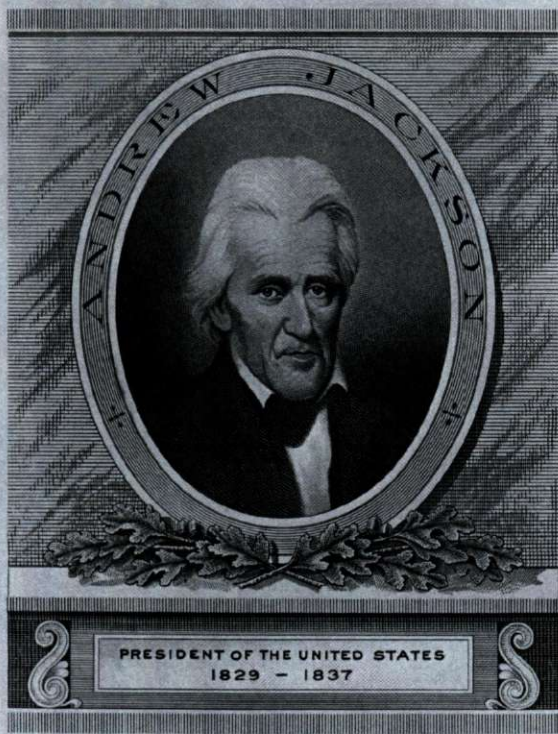
The presidents, chronologically, are Washington, Jefferson, Jackson, Lincoln, Grant, Garfield, Cleveland, McKinley, T. Roosevelt, and Taft. All but Taft include each president's years in office, which means the cards were probably printed before Taft took his oath in March of 1910. Perhaps the timing was meant to capitalize on the pending inauguration. I know of one other collection of these cards and it appears this group of 10 represents a full set. Lowell apparently cherry-picked the most popular (and most recent) of the presidential line-up.

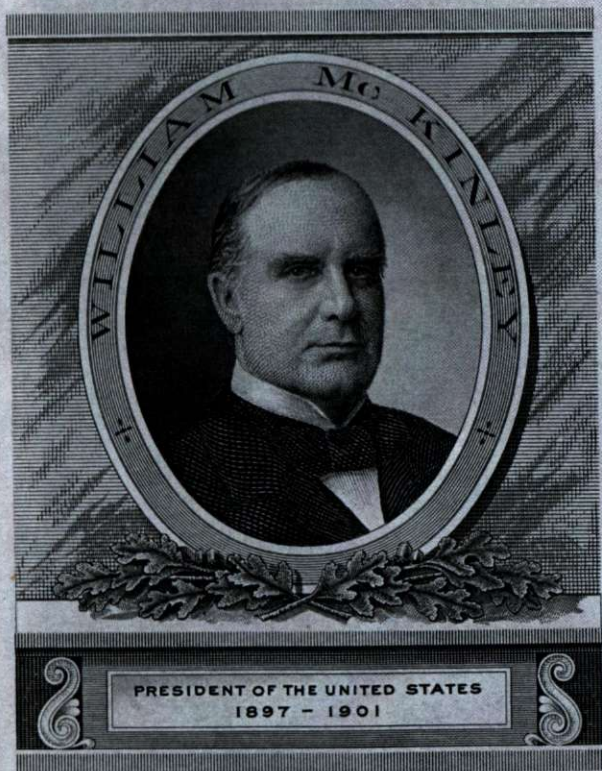
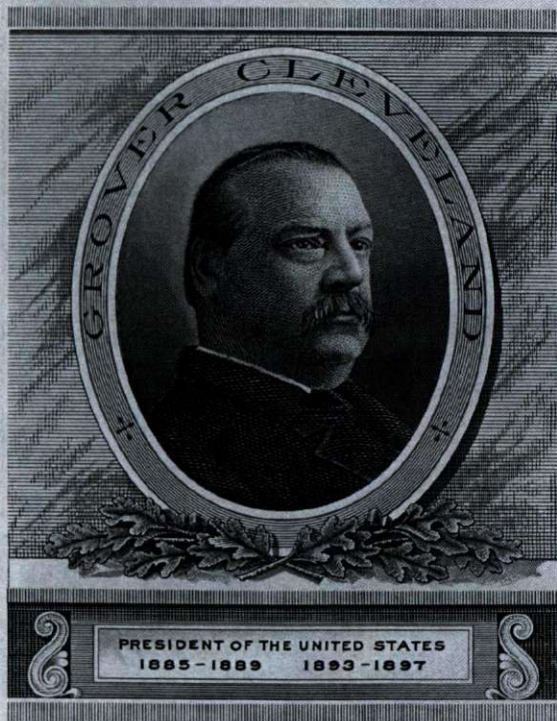
One curious note: below the portrait of Cleveland the barest remnants of the word "COMPLIMENTS" are visible. Perhaps this card was cut down from something larger, but we will likely never know.

SCCS founder Curt Radford wrote an article in 1992 for the Essay-Proof Journal, which illustrates a couple of the presidential cards and others. According to the article, John A. Lowell began working in Boston in 1858, eventually forming John A. Lowell Bank Note Engraving Company, which produced securities until around 1920, as well as stationery. They were also known for their art prints, holiday cards, calendars, and trade cards. During the scrap metal drives of WWII, many copper and steel plates were sold off, though apparently some, like the McKinley plate, survived. The company did not, however, being sold several times following the

war. It ultimately ended up as part of the Nimrod Press, based in Boston.







Early in August I attended the ANA show in Denver. It is usually the best numismatic show of the year. Great education sessions run the length of the show.

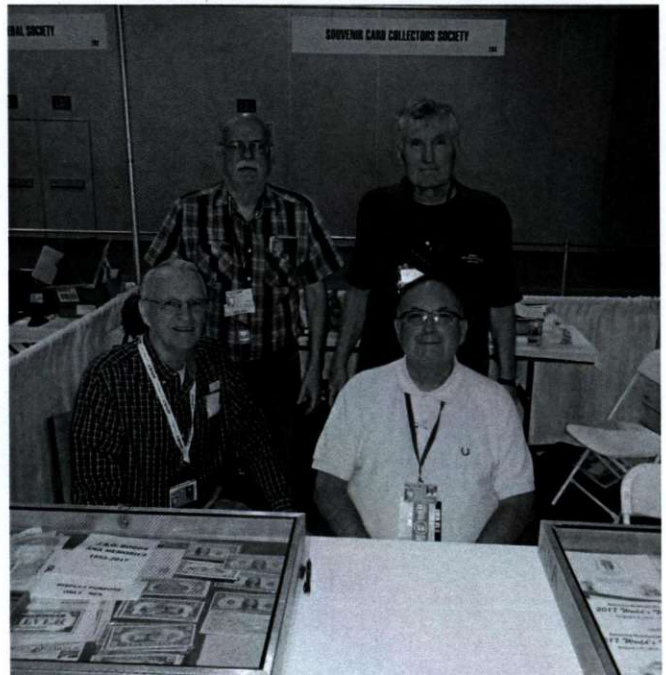
I helped man the SCCS table, along with Ken Barr and Steve Costner, which, as usual, was at the rear of the room, but quite close to the BEP, Mint and Post Office. That was very convenient, but being so far back in the Club and Society section, we didn't get many visitors.

For a souvenir card collector/dealer, the challenge this year was the prints that the Bureau was raffling. Three different cards and only 33 of each! We expected a difficult time to put together sets. But as it turned out, there weren't a lot of people at the drawings and there were a number of people willing to sell or trade. The big challenge was to put together matching sets of numbered cards. For me, it wasn't until the third day that my name was drawn, so I had to purchase (at a premium) most of my cards. There were several people who were drawn multiple times and even twice in a day! Fortunately, I was able to acquire enough to satisfy my subscribers.

I was surprised to see the USPS bring a Philatelic Truck to the show. Not one of the original ones, but a modern truck they use in the region to go to nursing homes to sell stamps and pick up packages. The USPS is getting severely restrictive in going to shows, at least to numismatic shows. I can't speak to the philatelic side.

We met with the BEP staff to discuss future offerings. They have not replaced Karen Smith, but are doing with current staff and seem to be trying to keep up the program. Next year the program will be based on the WWI anniversary and they have some nice material for what looks like a three card program again. I, for one, hope they do not do three different prints. We also met with the new BEP Director. He was very personable and seemed like a regular guy.

The show ended on Saturday and most of us went to the ANA in Colorado Springs on Sunday. All attendees were invited and many took the bus ride of about an hour. It was a very nice event, with free food, a gift bag and an open house to the entire facility. It a great place to visit and it had been over 10 years since my last time.

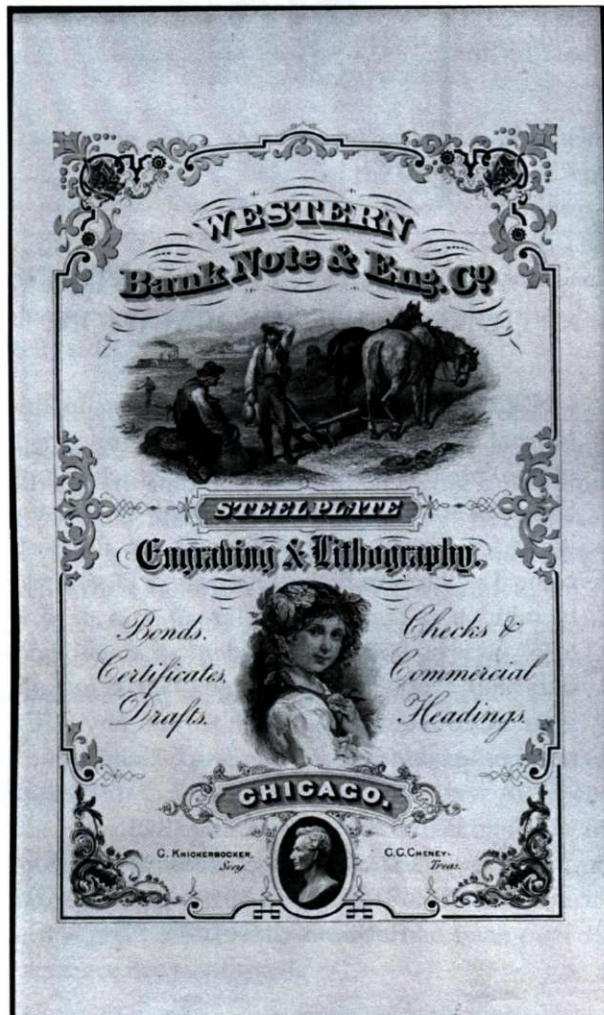
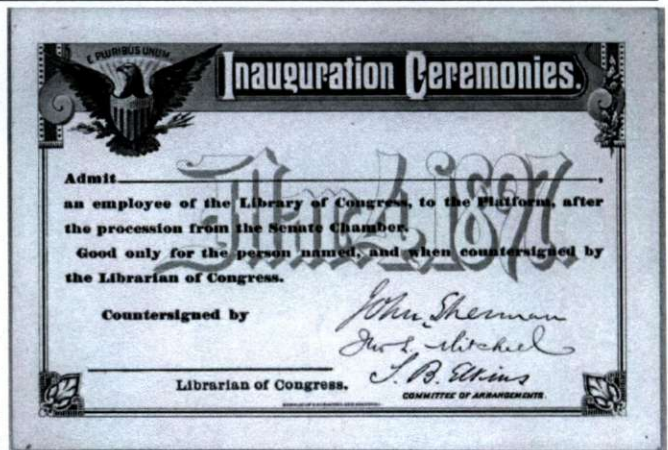

There is a remarkable amount of engraved material from bank note companies (and the BEP) in the Library of Congress, primarily in their Prints and Photographs collection. An interested collector could easily spend a full day or two in their Reading Room combing through vignette and banknote proofs, advertising sheets and collateral material. Fortunately, some items in the collection have been scanned and are viewable on line. Here is a handful of sand-out that I came across through online searches. Some of these pieces are quite large, particularly the advertising sheets for bank note printers and Home Insurance Co. Others are small, such as the 1897 pass for the Presidential Inauguration, specifically for a Library of Congress representative. There was even a forerunner that I came across, one of the souvenir cards issued at the 1897 Tennessee Centennial Exposition—FB1897B(a). There is a wealth of knowledge to be gleaned at our national library, just visit www.loc.gov. [Two of Greg's finds are on the front and back covers of this issue. Ed.]

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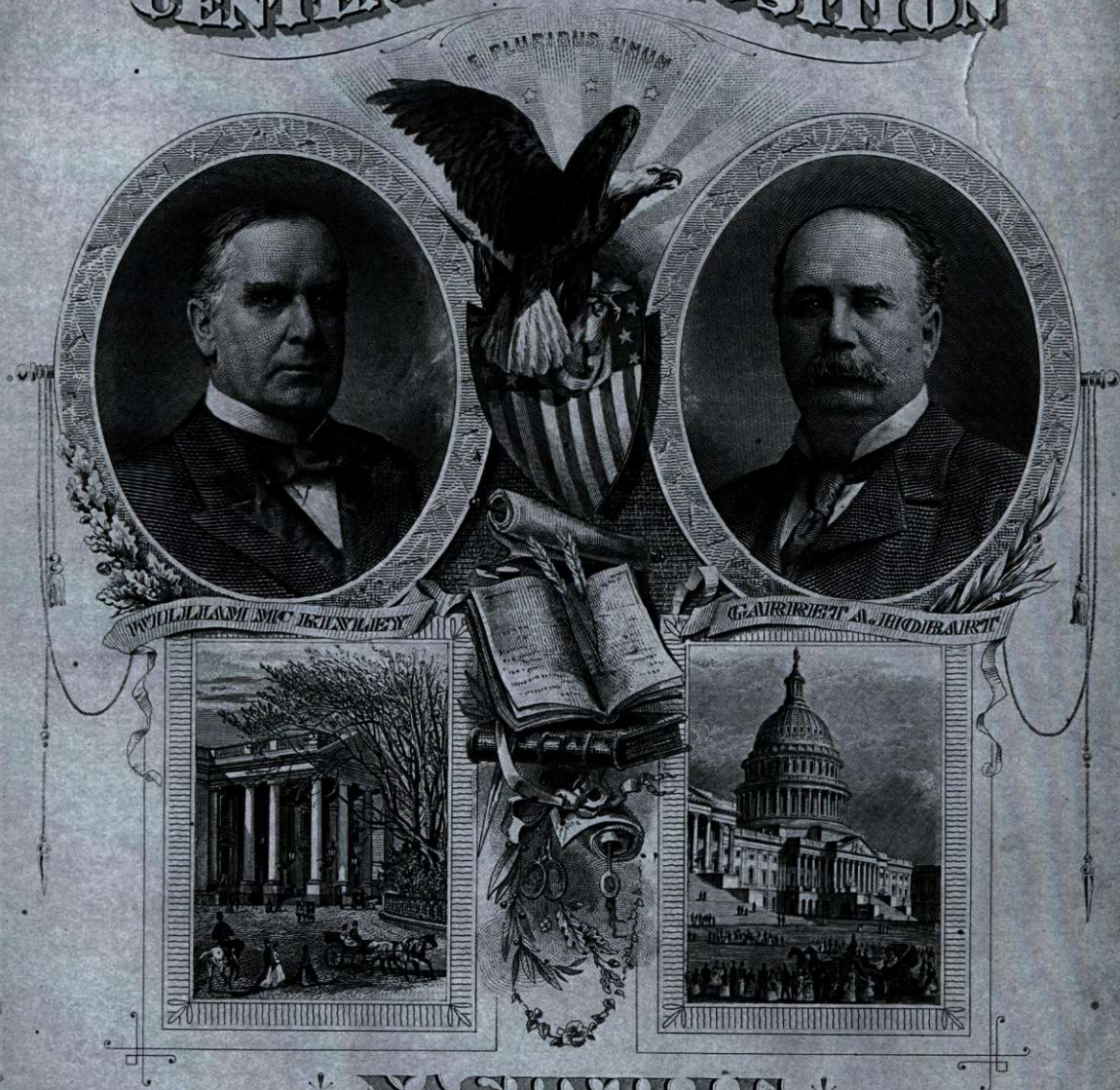

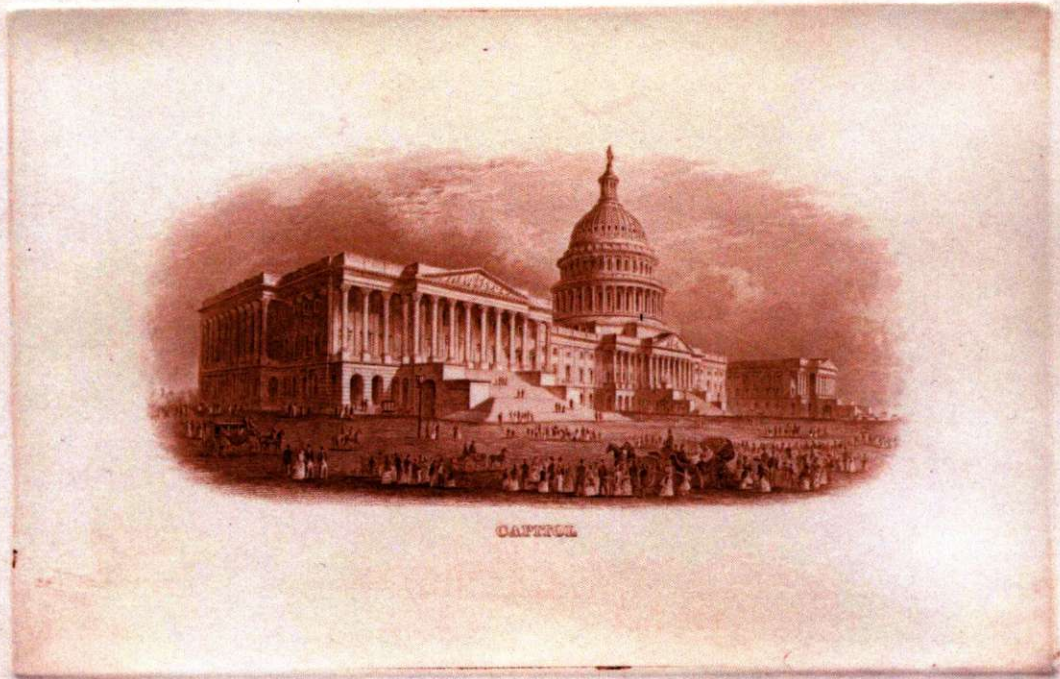

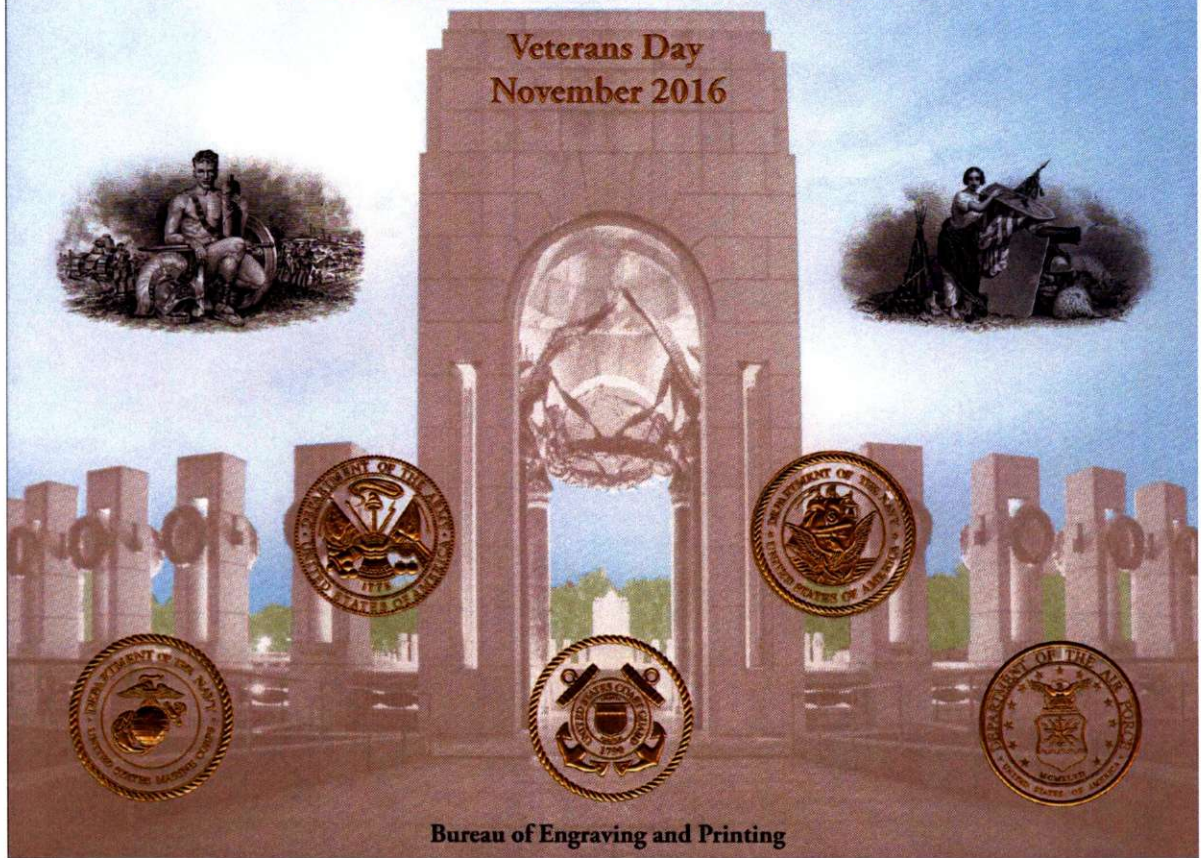
