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

The first quarter has passed and spring is here, even though here in Florida winter never really arrived. The SCCS had a table at the FUN show in January. [see p. 11] Helping to man the table were **Steve Costner**, **O. T. Thompson**, and **Carlos Guffain**. I gave a presentation on Czechoslovakian engravers. Member **Jim Suchma** provided door prizes of some engravings he had done by **Mike Bean**. We had about a dozen members come by and added several new and returning members. Welcome **Ed Kuzsmar**, **Herb McAlpine**, **Phil Cambers**, and **Art Benjamin**.

The big news was that the government shutdown messed with the debut of the BEP card. There were supposed to be daily drawings, but the BEP never showed. The Mint showed up regardless, but when we inquired about the BEP card that they are supposed to be marketing, all we got was blank stares. We received several reports of how tricky it was to get into the Bureau on the Mint website and then order a subscription. Then there was a claim that all 8,000 cards were sold out! Impossible you say. Well at the end of February we learned that a telemarketing group known as The Coin Vault (TCV) was marketing the \$20 cards for nearly \$80! Congratulations if you got your subscription in on time. I didn't. Time will tell about the implications of this new player in the market.

There are many questions. Did TCV buy ALL the subscriptions or just the first card? Will the BEP hold some cards out for the ANA show in Chicago, or will they show up with the spider press and nothing to sell? Member-dealer **Ken Barr** says that he will put out a modest buy price for the secondary market and see what comes in. I may have to wait years to get a card at a reasonable price. We will see.

Greg Alexander is working hard online with our catalog committee. We are trying to define exactly what is a souvenir card and what identification numbers should apply and cleaning up past problems. Ken Barr, Harry Corrigan, Bill Kriebel, and I are weighing in. Greg is also helping out on a free web site called the Paper Money Forum [papermoneyforum.com]. Members should look it up as he often introduces topics dealing with souvenir cards.

Bill Kriebel tells me eight members have still to renew their membership. I sent emails and got one

sad response. Member Steve Feiertag informs us that he is retiring from collecting, but is donating [what's left] of his collection to the Society. Bill Kriebel will probably work these into our auction. According to the Treasurer's report from last year, our expenses were way over income. We need to raise extra money because printing fees [or postage] aren't getting any cheaper. The income from Feiertag cards may help, but some of us who have better cards may need to donate cards to the auction to raise extra money.

Here is what I plan to do to "fly the flag" and get more members. I plan to man a society table at the Summer FUN show July 11-13. Then I will tentatively do the same at AMERICOVER in St. Louis, July 26-28. I plan to give a program "First Day Souvenir Cards." Next we will have a table in Omaha, August 1-4 at the APS STAMPSHOW. Then we plan to be at ANA show at Rosemont, IL, August 13-17. Any of you near those sites that would like to help me assist at the table will be appreciated.

Last, I would like to thank member Lorne Lavertu who for some time has offered to fund memberships for new, young collectors. Bill Kriebel is working to add five new members this way. Thank you Lorne. If you have suggestions or questions about what is going on, our emails and phone numbers are listed in the journal [page 1]. Keep in touch and try to recruit a new member.

The card itself was, in my opinion, not well-designed. The marketing, now via the U.S. Mint, was poor and the servicing from a "Fulfilment Center," in Memphis, TO, questionable. I do not know if the unfortunate government shutdown had anything to do with the problems. Those trying to order late, received this message (supposedly 8,000 were printed)!

Well, then it seems that The Coin Vault (TCV), apparently discovered the BEP product while working the U.S. Mint's site and decided it would be a nice addition to its sales marketing of Apollo related memorabilia. So, what was \$17.00 each for the subscription (i.e \$51.00 for the three), or \$20.00 each separately, has now become \$79.98 for one! Any takers?

Speaking of marketing Apollo 11, the U.S. Mint is offering a special commemorative half-dollar proof coin for \$32.95, or an uncirculated version for \$2.00 less! But wait, the GovMint.com, in Minnesota, will provide you with one for \$39.95 + s/h or "free shipping on 4 or more!" I am not a coin collector and I

find it difficult to believe that they will ever be of that "value." I collect for enjoyment, not investment!








Gene Hessler *The Engraver's Line* (1993) describes Low as responsible for the art work and the engraving as executed by Charles Schlecht (1843-1932). "There were 25,555 diplomas printed for the participants from 86 countries, colonies and principalities." The oversize card (18"x24") was reprinted by the BEP

(B-1992A), a copy of which was included in the last auction. This illustration is from the catalog of a recent exhibit at the University of Pennsylvania exploring exhibitions and trade fairs, which included some of the items from their exhibit for which this certificate was awarded.

This essay attempts to expand upon one aspect of souvenir card collecting mentioned in the article which discusses the nature of the Society (p. 19, The Souvenir Card Journal, First Quarter 2019). It describes a personal adventure in obtaining a "show canceled" card. While, I believe that many society members, myself included, collect a variety of things intaglio, the main focus of the Society deals with souvenir cards. The bulk of my collection of cards could better be thought of as an accumulation, amassed since the 1980s when I first became aware of them. However, I do try to restrict myself to cards obtained at shows or events that I attend. Thus, those cards truly become "something to remember them by," as described in the article. What makes a card more memorable for me? Obtaining a show cancel. This might seem like a rather simple procedure, not worthy of particular notice memory-wise. However, the process involved in getting the cancellation often makes the card and therefore the event itself more memorable.

One such canceled card in my collection stands out from the others, the card issued for the 400th Anniversary of Jamestown in May of 2007 [B-285]. The article mentions the Jamestown Ter-Centenial Exhibition. There were four cards issued by the Bureau of Engraving and Printing (BEP) for that exhibition: Captain John Smith, Theodore Roosevelt, the U.S.S. Virginia, and an outstretched eagle. For the 400th anniversary, at my suggestion, the Bureau issued one card, a reprise of the 1907 Captain John Smith card, enhanced with impressions of three stamps issued in 1907. Having moved to the Jamestown/Williamsburg, VA area a few years prior to the 400th celebration, I was looking forward to the event. The philatelic community was getting excited about the issuance of the first triangular U.S. stamp, which represents the shape of the original Jamestown fort. When I found out that the Bureau was going to issue a card for the event, I was getting excited too. Now I would have a card and the stamp to go with it. May 11 finally came around. There was a first day ceremony for the stamp and the Postal Service had set up a cancellation station. The Postal Service had outdone themselves with various related products. But where was the card? It was not to be found. I later found out that due to production difficulties, the card was not ready for the celebration, but would be issued in Washington a week later, on May 18.



What to do?

I decided to purchase the card on the day of issuance and to get whatever cancels I could to commemorate the anniversary event after the fact. So, on the morning of May 18, I drove to Washington (about 150 miles), parked the car across the Potomac in Virginia and took the Metro into Washington. I purchased several cards at the BEP and set out to get a local cancel. Unfortunately, the Bureau no longer did Visitor Center cancels. Also, my usual go-to place for Washington cancels, the West Virginia postal station in the American History Museum, had closed.

My next idea was to go to the National Postal Museum. So, I took the Metro to Union Station, which is next to the Postal Museum. Having secured a cancel there, I was back on the Metro to get my car and head back to Williamsburg. There, I decided that it would be nice to get a rather unique cancel at the Colonial Williamsburg station. (This station is now closing, but I understand that cancels may still be

available at one of the stores in the restored area.) Then, on to the main Post Office in Williamsburg where they let me use the first day of issue cancel on the Jamestown stamp, albeit a week late. I finally had the souvenir I wanted.

The SCCS needs volunteers!

We are currently establishing a Cataloging Committee to aid the society in managing the ongoing numbering of souvenir cards and intaglio prints. This will include:

- Specifically defining the criteria for listing cards in the SCCS numbering system
- Considering whether categories should be reorganized or renumbered

One thing missing at FUN was the BEP. The FUN program advertised daily drawings for "pulled proofs," but they never showed up. The plan was to have 50 cards of the first issue of the 2019 series for the 50th anniversary of the moon landing. The synergy between the Mint and the BEP wasn't at work, as Mint employees knew nothing of the cards. If the FUN organizers had known that the BEP wasn't coming, they could have scheduled Mike Bean and his press. We all speculated that the Bureau will have some sort of super drawing in Chicago at the ANA in August using all three cards similar to what they did at Philadelphia last summer.

experts in the engraver's art. Unlike in America, many European stamp issuing agencies allow the names of the designers and engravers to be noted in small letters on the stamps.



He bought some old engravings and had Mike Bean create cards, and we all received and copy of an engraved check from the Bank of Montreal.

SCCS members are invited to next meet in Chicago at the ANA national meeting in August. We plan to have a meeting card and enjoy participation by the BEP. We hope to see you there.

In the previous 1Q 2019 Journal (p. 17), I covered Harry Corrigan's discovery of what turned out to be a Directors Presentation Folder, produced in 1995 by the Bureau of Engraving and Printing. Lengthy correspondence with the BEP's Historic Research Center (HRC) turned up 18 different varieties of these folders documented in their archives, between 1973 and the present.

The HRC has provided me with images of most of these special folders and, with the Bureau's permission, we will present them here in the Journal. To do these justice, we will spread them out over three consecutive issues, rather than trying to condense them into one. All the folders feature intaglio Bureau vignettes and portraits, typically presented in an artfully designed format. Though it may not be obvious in these scans, each engraving is affixed to a panel of the folder in some way. The HRC describes the folders as tokens of goodwill for leaders, directors, and delegations, often given out at conferences.


The first known Director's Folder was produced in 1973 for the First Pacific Rim Banknote Conference, held in Australia. This event, held annually in the fall, later became known as simply the Pacific Rim Conference. Initially, these conferences were for government and commercial printers of stamps, currency, and other securities. At some time during the 1980s, stamp production was spun off into the Government Postage Stamp Printers' Conferences.




James A. Conlon was the Bureau director in 1973 and the folder that year was a dark blue, faux leather, side-fold piece, with the affixed card featuring the U.S. Capitol in pink, courtesy of the "United States Delegation." The card also includes text thanking the host nation and flags of the participating countries.



The BEP archives also include a second, offset printed card without text shows three buildings: the Federal Reserve, the Treasury, and the BEP (representatives from each agency attended). It's unclear if or how this was included in the folder; it may have been an rejected design sample. Documentation indicates only 25 of these folders were made.



The second folder, produced for the 1975 Pacific Rim Conference II in Bangkok, Thailand, was more elaborate. The cover shows an eagle silhouette in a lathework pattern, along with gold embossed seals of the Federal Reserve and the Treasury.



Inside, the first affixed card features intaglio portraits of Presidents Lincoln and Ford, with a blind embossed Great Seal of the United States. A card on a second page includes crystal mounts for four sets of stamps, produced by the Bureau using a variety of printing methods. In the scan provided by the HRC, only the lower right mount was filled with Scott #1207. However, using a little intuitive deduction, I have "added" the most likely contemporary stamps that fit both the size and descriptions.







The 1977 folder for Pacific Rim Conference III, in Ottawa, Canada, also features gold embossed seals on a cover of dark blue stock. The top-hinged first page shows an enlarged 1860s sailor vignette above six stamps or blocks, again in crystal mounts, exhibiting the BEP's varied printing abilities. Most




interesting among them is a previously unknown test stamp in the upper right. The stamp, showing Alaskan fur seals, is dated 1975 and used "Experimental Roto Color" on "Press A." On the following page is text at the top and a list of the U.S. delegates, with a screened collage of BEP products. Below is an affixed card with a multicolored sunburst next to an intaglio vignette of a tall ship at full sail.

The next folder that follows in 1989, after a 12-year gap, appears to be more generic. It does not cite

It does not cite any specific conference or event. This is a triptych folder of dark navy blue stock, with only

"Bureau of Engraving and Printing" in silver ink on the front. The folder opens onto an affixed intaglio portrait of Alexander Hamilton with a die cut frame, flanked by panels of text in silver ink. The text talks about fine line engraving as an anti-counterfeiting




measure; I believe there may be additional pages with further text. This folder may have been the first Directors Folder that appropriately fit its description – a presentation folder that Director Peter Daly could personally hand out to visiting dignitaries.


A similar folder was produced in 1992, this time on white stock. The cover appears to have gold foil embossed lettering and BEP seals. The triptych format is a repeat of the 1989 folder, with the same framed Hamilton portrait in the center panel. The text differs, however, with a brief history of the Bureau on the left and a bio of Hamilton on the right. Again, this folder does not mark any particular event.

Since these folders were not products intended for sale, the BEP kept few records on how many were produced. In 1995, 100 were printed and documents suggest this number was typical for other folders in the '90s. I suspect no more than 150 were pro-

duced for later years, but this is only conjecture. Look for more on these Directors Presentation Folders from the 1990s in the next Journal issue.

At long last, a committee has been formed to address some ongoing issues regarding the SCCS numbering system. For the past decade or more, assigning catalog numbers to new cards and trying to sort out a cataloging policy has fallen solely on the shoulders of our editor and past president, **Bill Kriebel**. This really should have been taken up by a work group of members long ago, to share the load and add some discussion to the decision-making. So, at the ANA show in Philadelphia last August, I began approaching members to see who might be willing to volunteer.

The Cataloging Committee (CatCom for short) currently has five members. Bill will continue to provide input, along with myself (committee chair), **Ken Barr**, **Harry Corrigan**, and SCCS president **Steve Patrick**. We are going to see how well this number functions and may add more committee members down the line.

Presently, CatCom is communicating via email. Our first priority is to nail down specific criteria for inclusion/exclusion in the SCCS catalog. Numbering has been somewhat fuzzy and arbitrary in the past, so we've been working on a list of consistent standards, with separate criteria for forerunners and non-fore-

runners. After this we will begin assigning numbers to the backlog of unlisted cards that have surfaced as we've built the website photo gallery.

Other issues to be considered include possible renumbering/delisting of some cards, reorganizing certain card categories, and potentially adding new categories. Committee members have already brought up a number of work projects, which should keep us busy for some time. The Society can expect more news from the committee in the near future.

Apollo 11 50th Anniversary Commemorative Engraved Print Collection The Moon Landing

Background: President John F. Kennedy's famous 1961 challenge to the Nation of "achieving the goal, before this decade is out, of landing a man on the moon and returning him safely to the Earth," launched a quest that helped shape and define the 1960s and would forever change the future of the nation and space exploration.

MISSION

Description: This print is symbolic of the United States Space Program's MISSION leading up to the first manned moon landing. The design features an embossing of the Apollo 11 and the lunar surface, with an engraving of President John F. Kennedy and the inscription, "We choose to go to the moon in this decade and do the other things, not because they are easy, but because they are hard."

ABNCo PRODUCTION MATERIAL

Over the past year in a number of sales, Archives International Auctions (AIA) has included residual material from American Bank Commemoratives among their auction lots. Veteran **SCCS** will members remember **ABN** Commemoratives as a subsidiary headed by Paul Schmid in the 1990s, which marketed consumer products, including souvenir cards, currency prints, and greeting cards.

Some of the items have been large bulk lots of SO cards, others have been intriguing errors and production material. I thought it would be interesting to compile some illustrations.

SO-85 and SO-110 are both cards which were issued with attached hologram stickers in the lower left. AIA had large lots of each card, all minus the stickers. You can see the placement marks of where they were to be affixed. These were probably surplus cards that were never finished.

Similar production material was probably unneeded "overage" printed as a precaution to replace any damaged cards in an order. This would include the sets of 1995 Kingdom of Hawaii currency reprints, printed on large sheets but not cut down to the size they were eventually sold.

Production proofs were also sold, which included just the intaglio portions of a souvenir card to review quality. This included proofs of SO-90, SO-90A, SO-92, and SO-118. Proofs of both the black and multicolor components of SO-107 were shown on the back cover of the previous Journal.

Full sets and bulk lots of SO-144 to 147 were also sold – all minus the serial numbers. In issued form, these had printed numbers in the lower right, with a limited release of 425 cards. These cards were also probably overage, though some may have been intended for use as the special, embossed "Cards for Collectors," raffled off at shows. These were handnumbered and did not have printed serial numbers.

The most interesting piece I saw in the AIA auctions was an "error" card. I use quotes here, because it's hard to believe something this obvious could have slipped past quality control without some help. The card is an invert error, but more than that -- it has elements of TWO cards: the engraved plate of SO-118 and the offset image from SO-120. I'm not sure how this could have occurred unintentionally. Regardless, bidders found it desirable and it was hammered down at \$146, including buyer's premium.

Keep your eye out for more of this material in future AIA auctions.


For five years, beginning in 1990, the American Bank Note Company had a small subsidiary company, American Bank Note Commemoratives, exclusively represented by Paul W. Schmid, Inc.


A long-time professional philatelist, Mr. Schmid was in a unique position with regards to the archival steel plates held by ABNCo. Working with the company's archivist, Aurelia Chen, Mr. Schmid had virtually unlimited access to the thousands of steel plates and dies held in their Pennsylvania vaults at Horsham and Philadelphia, and was able to create a new line of engraved commemorative products from this holding.


Under his direction, ABNCo continued to produce the Archive Series, begun in 1987, through 1992, with some of their most beautiful vignettes.


Prior to his arrival, ABNCo had produced souvenir cards for a limited number of coin and paper money shows. Mr. Schmid was instrumental in expanding it to include philatelic shows and having the company set up an original hand-operated spider press, at shows around the country, to demonsrate early printing techniques and create collectible products available to the public.


Another major production was the American Paper Money Collection.














THE **COLUMBUS**



American Bank Note Company

The City Council of Brunswick, Georgia Currency Series. Circa 1870 - 1880

Sometime after the Civil War, probably about 1870-1880, the City of Brunswick, Georgia, located on the state's Atlantic coast, asked American Bank Note Company to prepare a series of municipal bank notes.


Because of National Currency legislation adopted in the middle 1860's, state banks found it impractical to continue issuing their own bank notes. However, municipalities, like Brunswick, were not subject to many of these regulations, and were free to issue their own currency.

The Branswick notes were to be accepted at face value for all money due the city, or if held for five years they were to be redeemable at a rate of one percent interest per year. For reasons unknown, it now appears that these notes were never issued. The note below is intaglio printed from the original 19th century steel plate held in the vaults of the American Bank Note Company.

Our webmaster, **Rod Charlton**, has started the extensive project of scanning Souvenir Card Journal back issues. In the Members Area, click on the link to "Past Journal Issues" to see the progress. We presently have the past couple years available; email me if you'd like access to download these. Many Journal covers are in place to give members an idea of what's


to come. However, this is a time-consuming process and is likely to take a year or more.

- 1. BEP sales have been combined with those of the U.S.Mint. Their site no longer lists any of the previous intaglio prints, except "Defenders" (\$20 each, \$85 for the five). It is not easy to find—use "search" for "BEP Products." They do list presidential portraits and governmental buildings.
- 2. Mike has donated 25 copies of the show-card (MB-74) to the SCCS, they are offered (see p.2, of SCJ 38:2) (200 were printed). The "free raffle" card (100 printed) are not available.
- 3. It is my understanding that, along with the ASDA, APS does not plan to issue any more souvenir cards. They have decided to provide cachets instead, presumably a matter of the expense involved.
- 4. Several cards were issued. Show \$5 m./\$6 c., Banquet \$7 &\$ 8, add \$1.25 per order.
